REGULATIONS

1. The show will be held at Falmouth on **Saturday 29th March, and Sunday 30th March** and is open from 10 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. on the first day, and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on the second day.
2. Exhibitors must give notice, in writing, of the classes in which they intend to exhibit to the Show Director one week before the show. Late entries may be considered if space permits. Not more than 3 entries may be made in any one class, except single bloom daffodil classes where an exhibitor may stage any number of entries per class providing they are different. **THERE ARE NO ENTRY FEES.**
3. Prize Money will not be awarded unless indicated.
4. Any exhibitor, whether Professional, Trade or Amateur, may show in the Open section.
5. Exhibitors in the Amateur Section must not employ paid assistance or earn their livelihood from gardening or be in any way connected with the market gardening, nursery or seed trade.
6. Exhibits may be staged between 10 a.m. and 7 p.m. on Friday 28th, then the hall will be cleared for the judges. The Committee reserves the right to move or reposition any exhibit where required. Judging will take place at 7.30 p.m. on Friday 28th.
7. In all classes where cut material is shown, all stems must reach the water in the vase or other receptacle.
8. **ALL EXHIBITS SHOULD BE CORRECTLY NAMED, SO AS TO ADD TO THE EDUCATIONAL VALUE OF THE SHOW.** Errors in naming will not disqualify, but the judges should regard correctness and clearness of naming as telling in favour of an exhibit in a close competition. If an exhibitor does not know the name of any variety, the label should bear the words: 'Name Unknown'. When an unnamed seedling is shown (e.g. seedling Daffodil), the label should bear the word 'SEEDLING', followed by an indicative number.
9. During staging, exhibitors must not place any article, flowers, or moss on spaces other than the position allotted them, and they are not allowed to interfere with other exhibits.
10. **No exhibit will be allowed to be cut or removed until after the close of the show.** Every care will be taken for the protection of all plants, flowers, etc. but the Committee will not be responsible for any loss or damage. It is particularly desired that exhibitors will notify the Secretary if they are unable to collect their exhibits promptly at the close of the show. See footnote on entry form.
11. Judges will be at liberty to withhold prizes when the exhibits are deficient in merit. The judges' decision is final.
12. Specimens shown must have been in the possession of the exhibitor for at least three months prior to the date of the show, with the exception of classes of 'The Floral Art Section'.
13. Nurserymen etc. can display their own trade notices, catalogues, etc. with their exhibits, but no advertising notices may be displayed. Stands must not be dismantled before the Show closes.
14. All Cups and Trophies are held for one year and are to be returned to the Committee in good condition one month prior to the Annual Show.
15. Exhibits in the Pot Plant classes must have been grown in the pots in which they are exhibited and been in the possession of the exhibitor for at least three months.
16. Hardy plants may be opened under glass or otherwise.
17. All vases will be lent by the Committee, free of charge.
18. All objections, complaints, and protests must be made in writing and accompanied by a fee of 50 pence to the Secretary on the first day of the Show for submission to the Committee. On any matter not provided for in these Regulations, the decision of the Committee shall be final. Deposit money in each case will be forfeited if the objection etc. is not sustained.

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System of Daffodil Classification

- Division 1 Trumpet Daffodils = The trumpet or corona is as long or longer than the perianth segments.
- Division 2 Large Cupped = The cup or corona is more than one-third, but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments.
- Division 3 Small Cupped = The cup or corona is not more than one-third of the length of the perianth segments.
- Division 4 Double Daffodils = One or more flowers to a stem, with doubling of the perianth segments or the corona or both.
- Division 5 Triandus Daffodils = Usually two or more pendant flowers to a stem, perianth segments reflexed.
- Division 6 Cyclamineus Daffodils = Perianth segments significantly reflexed, flower at an acute angle to the stem, with very short pedicel (neck).
- Division 7 Jonquilla & Apodanthus Daffodils = One to five flowers to a stem, perianth segments spreading or reflexed, corona usually wider than long, flowers usually fragrant.
- Division 8 Tazetta Daffodils = Usually three to twenty flowers to a stout stem, perianth segments spreading not reflexed, flowers usually fragrant.
- Division 9 Poeticus Daffodils = Perianth segments pure white, corona very short or disc-shaped, usually with a green and/or yellow centre and a red rim, but sometimes of a single colour, flowers usually fragrant.
- Division 10 Bulbocodium Daffodils = Perianth segments insignificant compared with the dominant corona, anthers attached more or less centrally to the filament and style usually curved.
- Division 11 Split Corona Daffodils = (a) with the corona segments opposite the perianth segments; the corona segments usually in two whorls of three, (b) with the corona segments alternate to the perianth segments usually in a single whorl of six
- Division 12 Other Daffodils = Those which do not fit the definition of any other division.
- Division 13 Daffodils distinguished solely by botanical name.

For many years Daffodils have been letter coded to assist in the identification of colours, this system is used within the Schedule. You will see 9W-GYR Cantabile, this defines the variety as from Division 9 and have a white perianth with green centre, a yellow middle zone, and a red rim to the cup or corona.

A single letter will denote it to be one colour

W = white, Y = yellow, G = green, R = red, P = pink, O = orange.

Section 1

OPEN CLASSES

Any competitor may enter this section, whether professional, trade or amateur.

SHRUBS

Note: A Spray is with many blooms on a branch. A Truss is one bloom or head. Whilst there is no size restriction, will exhibitors please make every endeavour to keep sizes to a reasonable limit.

For Camellia classes the following classification will apply to this Schedule.

Single Flowered = usually 8 and not more than 9 petals with stamens prominent in the centre.

Semi Double = 2 or more rows of petals with stamens prominent in the centre.

Anemone form = Flat with one or more rows of outer petals with a centre mass of petaloides and stamen intermingled.

Paeony Form = Rounded, with several rows of outer petals and centre of twisted petaloides and stamens.

Rose Form = Imbricated (overlapping) petals, showing stamens in a concave centre when fully opened.

Formal Double = Many rows of imbricated and regular petals - no or seldom showing stamens.
